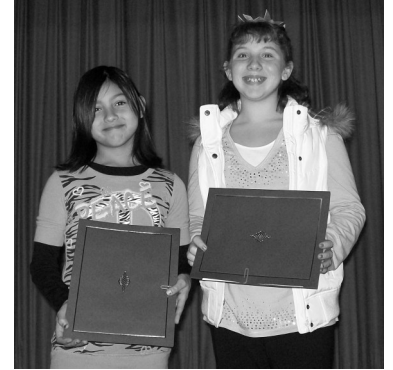

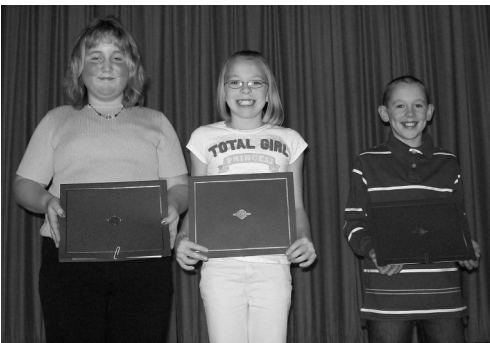

### Wet Walnut Creek Watershed Scholarship Available

Once again the Wet Walnut Creek Watershed District is offering a \$500.00 scholarship to a high school senior within the Watershed District. The scholarship is being awarded to promote agriculture, soil and water conservation and water quality.

The student should be planning a career in an agriculture related field. This is a broad based field ranging from Ag business, water and soil conservation, water quality, agronomy or other fields.

The recipient of the Wet Walnut Creek Watershed scholarship will also be considered for the \$200.00 scholarship offered by the State Association of Kansas Watersheds.

Seniors attending Ness City, LaCrosse, Otis Bison, Healy, Dighton and Western Plains High Schools are eligible for the scholarship.

## *Agritourism Workshop*

The Smoky Hills Resource Conservation & Development (RC&D) Area, Inc. is hosting the Smoky Hills Agritourism Workshop March 4, 2010. The workshop begins with registration at 8:30am at the Township Hall in Rush Center, located one block west of the 4-way stop on highway 96. The workshop is being sponsored in part by the Ness County Conservation District, Rush County Farm Bureau Association; Flame Engineering, Golden Belt Telephone Association Inc; Rush County Commissioners; Walnut Creek Extension; Dechant and Taylor, Chartered; Lacrosse Livestock Market; Nekoma State Bank; Golden Valley, Inc; Farmer's Bank & Trust, and Rick's Food Store.

Agritourism is a method by which farmers can diversify their farm products and supplement their agricultural incomes. It

can be thought of as one alternative for improving the incomes and potential economic viability of small farms and rural communities. Common agritourism activities in Kansas include: family outings to pick apples or pumpkins; assisting with an authentic cattle drive; relaxing at a winery; or going on a fall hunting trip. If you are interested in supplementing your income with an agritourism business, please attend the workshop on March 4.

Ben Allen of Kansas State University and Becki Rhoades of Kansas Department of Commerce are experts in the field of agritourism. They will be speaking about agritourism in Kansas, including regulations, promotion, and advertising. Shawna Oliver with Farm Bureau Financial Services will discuss high risk and liability insurance. A noon meal is included with your registration,

and it will be served by the KEPK-Relay for Life Team. In the afternoon

we will have virtual tours of Fairview Farms Alpacas and Cottage Lane Pumpkin Patch. The final session of the day will be a panel discussion with all the speakers. Vendors will also be available the day of the workshop.

### ***State Cost Share Sign-up: March 22—May 28*** ***Funds Available after July 1st***



Lane County Conservation District (LCCD) is conducting a sign-up March 22, 2010 through May 28, 2010, to accept requests for state financial assistance to install enduring conservation practices. The conservation district administers state cost-share programs locally to improve water quality and reduce soil erosion. Funding is provided by the State Conservation Commission (SCC) through appropriation from the Kansas Water Plan Fund.

Landowners with natural resource concerns on their property are encouraged to visit the LCCD office to discuss the possibility of receiving state financial assistance. Funding is provided through cost-share payments to landowners for eligible practices such as terraces, diversions, grassed waterways, field windbreaks, livestock tanks, wells and waste facilities, critical area planting, pasture and hay-land planting, cross fencing, and abandoned well plugging. (Consult LCCD for a more details), The sign-up does not guarantee approval of cost-share financial assistance. Projects started or completed prior to being approved for funding are not eligible for these funds.

Following the sign-up deadline each request is carefully reviewed to ensure eligibility. The proposed project is ranked according to a system developed by LCCD. The ranking system ensures fairness to landowners and ensures cost share funds are used to meet local conservation priorities. Landowners approved for the program are notified of the practice(s) approved and the estimated amount of cost-share that will be provided. Before the work can begin the contract is approved by the SCC and must be signed by the landowners(s).

The conservation district works closely with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). Conservation practices funded with state cost-share funds must be installed and maintained according to NRCS and SCC specifications. It is necessary that landowners work closely with NRCS in the planning stage to ensure practices are applied correctly. Technical assistance for these practices is provided free of charge by the USDA.
